# **Background**

The Cross Cutting Capacity Development (3cd) Program is a proposal of the Earthquakes and Megacities Initiative (EMI) that aims at assisting interested megacities around the world in improving their vision and orientation of Disaster Risk Management and disaster risk reduction. Current practice does not fully consider prevention and mitigation actions in city wide development plans, nor does it on urban planning and land use activities in the local governments. The Cities of Quezon and Makati, which are two of the 17 cities and municipalities that constitute Metropolitan Manila, agreed to collaborate in a one day workshop to start a partnership process to understand current disaster risk management arrangements in those cities, identify and document examples of sound practice, and learn about their vision regarding disaster risk management.

An initial assessment of DRM organization and delivery, as well as some sound practices had been already identified through a two-parts survey questionnaire designed by EMI and EdM on the second half of 2004.

A first stakeholder workshop took place in Quezon City Hall, and it is expected that the second workshop will be held in Makati City. In addition to the workshop, the 3cd Program Implementation Team (PIT) was able to visit and discuss issues related to the program with officials of different departments in both cities.

# Purpose of the Fieldtrip

This first field trip and bi-city stakeholder workshop, launches the partnership among city stakeholders and the 3cd Program Implementation Team (PIT) integrated by the local investigator, researchers from the Earthquake Disaster Mitigation and Research Center or EDM, the Pacific Disaster Center, PDC, and the 3cd Program Director. This workshop seeks to establish a common understanding of the actual situation of disaster risk management (DRM) in the city, while sharing information about sound practices.

Two specific objectives were pursued:

- To gather insights on current disaster risk management practices and practices that have been successful in reducing hazard risk and to which city officials consider are appropriate for consideration elsewhere ("sound practices") in the city.
- 2. To produce a common vision statement and come to an understanding of how to reach the desired outcome or desired state.

# Methodology

#### A city workshop

The workshop went over the original EdM-EMI survey to ensure that all relevant information has been collected. This required city officials and their colleagues to, prior to the workshop, review their original submission and be prepared to furnish further information if required. More details on this component were given preceding the workshop.

Workshop attendees were asked to present a vision of what they wish their city to have – and by when – with respect to DRM. The vision desired by stakeholders will provide direction for future activities within the city; it will also be the criteria upon which sound practices can be measured to help ensure

practices and vision match. By the end of the workshop, there will be clarity about what the city wishes to have in place with respect to DRM. Following the workshop, the PIT and LI will prepare a statement outlining the city's expectations, which will form the basis of the second workshop activities.

#### Individual meetings with the cities

Holding individual city meetings or workshops is an approach that helps the 3cd team keep track of particular activities in the cities, promote documentation and exchange of sound practices and other inter-city cooperation instruments, achieve a closer contact with city officials, facilitate one-on-one discussions and address specific needs of the city. At the same time, the team looks for effective means to integrate those lessons in the megacity context of Metropolitan Manila.

Therefore, a ½ day session with the senior staff of both Quezon and Makati was hosted by each one of these cities. One key objective was to better understand the context of DRM in each one of the cities, distribute and request feedback on the preliminary City Profile and Sound Practices identified and set a common understanding of the goals and methodology of the program.

The approach for the implementation of a comprehensive DRMMP and its expected process was also described in these meetings in order to get the participants' reactions to this initiative. In each one of the cities, city officials received the 3cd Team and the mayors of the cities briefly joined the workshops as a show of their support to the project.

# Debriefing and Agreements

#### **Formation of the Local Working Group**

The local advisory group is the project strategic group, gets things activated in the cities and provides support to do the follow up.

The need to count on delegates from both cities to be incorporated into the LWG was discussed. Access to the mayor and influence in other departments could be one of the attributes to select the city representatives. Mr. Pacifico Maghacot, head of the business permits and license office in Quezon and Mr. Nicanor Santiago, City Administrator of Makati were suggested.

The PIT was very pleased to confirm that the following highly competent and recognized professionals in Manila have kindly agreed to form the LWG. They showed their personal interest and commitment through an active participation in the workshop and the debriefing discussions.

#### **Evaluation of the workshop**

- Most of the participants in the workshop were linked to the response and rescue activities. Makati and Quezon Cities should encourage more involvement of the planning and governance groups in order to have a broader perspective that includes prevention and mitigation.
- Despite the previous consideration, having the response group talk with planning, engineering and others was an objective well accomplished.
- · Proceedings encapsulating the main findings are expected by the end of September; an initial draft should be sent as soon as possible for LWG feedback. It should be focused on DRM and incorporate annexes, power point presentations, list of participants, etc.
- Compile and analyze the responses to the workshop questionnaire, how the cities saw this workshop, being critical of our own activities may be a good example of sound practice.

#### **Sound Practices**

- There is available a good list of sound practices, but we still need to actually get them registered in our questionnaire or at least follow up through the contact persons.
- · It is recommended to show a couple a sound practices so people can better understand what the project is looking for.
- Between now and the next workshop it is necessary to document those sound practices. In the second workshop we should revisit those sound practices and provide some feedback from other cities around the world to see if some of them can fit the local needs and see how they can be adapted or adopted.
- Keep on looking for other actual practices through literature and available local documents. The international group can bring the international sound practices that have been found and get the local group to assist to combine, classify, compare and distribute them.

# Follow up and Next Steps

In order to meet local expectations on the project the following action items were identified as pertinent:

- Letters of recognition to the two mayors should be sent including references to the LI and LWG as well as the proceedings that will be prepared. This letter should ask for the support of the city towards the program objectives including working toward a City DRMMP.
- The LI will look for the best approach to incorporate a city representative from both, Quezon and Makati Cities in the LWG.
- It is important to make it clear to the city authorities what is the difference between the 3cd Initiative and other projects that are currently taking place in the city and how this project can actually build on previous or ongoing initiatives.
- By the end of October at the latest, we expect to have the proceedings already distributed to the cities, including some references to sound practices in both Makati, Quezon and elsewhere, including an analysis of where gaps are and if possible providing other examples than can fill that gap..

## **Next City Workshop**

- Late November 2004 or early February 2005 have been identified as tentative dates for the second workshop.
- EdM will prepare a draft concept and structure of the second workshop and propose it to the Program Director and LAG to start discussions about it.
- Focus group discussions prior to the second workshop could be very useful to keep things going and alive in the city. It would be necessary to decide on the type of questions or topics for discussion with direct input from the PIT.
- It might be interesting to have separate small group discussions in each city and then organize a combined session. Dr. Emmanuel Luna will prepare a document for feedback in parallel to future activities looking at the second workshop.

# 1.1 Topics for Discussion

#### Creating a DRM Vision for Your City

- 1. What vision does your sector have regarding disaster risk management in your city?
  - In dealing with disasters generally and reducing losses specifically, what does your sector require?
    - What are the current strengths and resources your sector has to address the needs?
    - What are the generic capacities your sector requires to meet the vision?

**A Vision** gives a focus for future direction and actions. It is an expression of expectation or desire of a future state. It is built upon the existing situation, but it is not restricted by it.

#### **Identifying Current Sound Practices**

#### 2. What are your sector's sound practices?

**Sound Practice means**: any proven idea, project, program, technique, mechanism, method, practice or procedure for assessing, managing and reducing risk in complex urban areas. This may be in areas relating to legislation, land use practice, education, building practices, enforcement, response, management risk reduction, hazard assessment, any combination of these or similar actions.

### 1.2 Results of Small Group Discussion 1

This group produced two vision statements:

- We envision a metropolitan emergency response sector that is totally prepared trough a unified system of effective response during disasters and emergencies.
- To systematically organize, develop and sustain an informal, valued and self-resilient community who will exemplify the practical will and leadership in responding to the needs of the most vulnerable in times of disaster and other calamities through a reliable communication system, efficient responding, monitoring and evaluation system, and a sound, financial status where Barangay Disaster Coordinating Council will be legally authorized to use calamity funds in the procurement of equipment/supplies even during the pre-disaster phase, and the conduct of regular training on FA and CPR and other training that calls for more on disaster preparedness and mitigation instead of relief and rehabilitation for a safe and healthy citizenry

#### **GROUP 3**

A less vulnerable and empowered community in reducing risk and managing disasters

Safe and disaster-prepared community
